## **Gustav Becker**

Gustav Becker was one of the best known makers of early Anniversary Clocks, and their factory produced a vast number of very high quality clocks of all types.

Their Anniversary clocks used the same basic movement, but the styles and the upper suspension brackets varied considerably.

Most examples carry the distinctive logos. The firm was bought by Junghans in 1925.

## Dating by serial number.

The majority of Gustav Becker clocks carried a serial number, and the factory records, kindly given to me by the late Karl Kochmann, show the numbers in use at various times. However, these numbers only relate to the Freiburg factory and there is some doubt over their accuaracy as new information comes to light. A new factory was opened at Braunau in about 1888, and the numbers began at 1. Junghans bought the business in 1925, and used a fresh range of serial numbers until they abandoned them. According to Karl Kochmann, the records of numbers used after 1926 were lost during the second world war. In order to date a <u>400 day</u> clock by the serial number, the table below is likely to give the right answer in most cases.
